February 28th would be my "Teaching Anniversary".


- **My journey in Jain**

SIGNIFICANCE OF GURU IN ONE `S LIFE

Everyone needs a good Guru to be successful in both material life and spiritual life. The word 'guru' in Hindi can be translated to, 'gu' for darkness and 'ru' for the one who dispels it. At the same time Dronacharya, Arjuna and his other disciples came to the forest and on seeing the dog with arrows constructed around the mouth in a circular pattern, wondered who is the warrior who shot the arrows with such perfection around the dog's mouth. Immediately, Ekalayva came forward and worshiping Dronacharya said it was he who shot the arrows. Dronacharya asked him from where he learnt archery and Ekalayva replied he learnt from Dronacharya himself, by building his statue. On hearing this Dronacharya tells him that he should give him guru dakshina and Ekalayva readily accepts and asks what should he give?

Dronacharya asks him to give his thumb, keeping in mind the promise he had given to Arjuna that there will be nobody in the world who will know archery better than Arjuna. Immediately Ekalayva cut his thumb and gave it to his guru Dronacharya as guru dakshina.

On receiving his thumb Guru Dronacharya blessed Ekalayva and he developed new skills in archery becoming a proficient archer shooting without his thumb, which became a legend for the generations to follow. A guru will always teach you what is good for you and hence you should have faith and respect for your guru and learn from him with full dedication to be successful in your life.

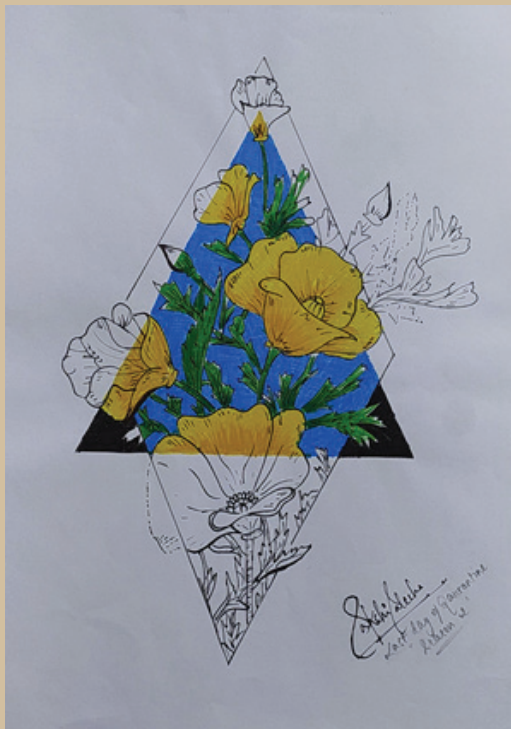
6. Give Back

Youth

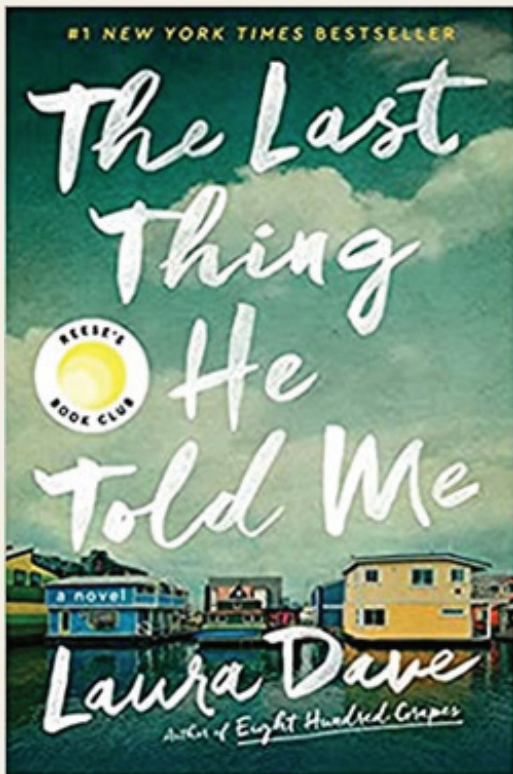
Youth is an energy of today,
