ABORTION - "Freedom of choice!"

Abortion is the removal of a fetus from the uterus before it has reached the stage of viability. It can occur naturally, which is also a case of miscarriage, or may be brought on purposefully, known as induced abortion. Natural abortions, or miscarriages, occur for many reasons, including disease, trauma, genetic defect, or biochemical incompatibility of mother and fetus. Occasionally a fetus dies in the uterus but fails to be expelled, which can be termed as a missed abortion.

Induced abortions may be performed in four general categories:

- 1. to preserve the life, physical or mental well-being of the mother
- 2. to prevent the completion of a pregnancy that has resulted from rape or incest
- 3. to prevent the birth of a child with serious deformity, mental deficiency, or genetic abnormality
- 4. to prevent a birth for social or economic reasons (such as a particularly young pregnant girl or the sorely strained resources of the family unit).



When women have no choice but to abort their child, it is usually a painful procedure, but also depends on which procedure they chose as some does not hurt. There are many side effects of abortion like nausea, fever, dizziness, heavy bleeding or vomiting. How they feel after abortion is different. Some will feel relieved or guilty, even after knowing that it was the right decision. If they still feel guilty and anxious, they can seek professional therapy and counseling, or support groups.

Abortion is a difficult topic. Society sometimes sees it as a bad and immoral step, especially if it is an induced abortion. They may even consider it as a mother killing her own child, depending on the situation. If it were a natural miscarriage, society would mostly support them emotionally. Yet sometimes society can make a woman feel that she is not worthy to be a mother and this could lower her self-esteem.

For those who have undergone abortion, you are not alone. There are many women around you and around the world who have gone through the same pain as you, physically and/or emotionally. Talk to someone that you trust, if you feel guilty about it. They would support you and comfort you. That is the reason why 15 October is celebrated as Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance Day, for you are never alone.








BOOK OF THE MONTH: Rather be Reading
